## Refrain from slander, Imams remind Muslims

MUSLIMS must learn to imprison the tongue to refrain from vain talk and exercise restraint, Imams said in the Friday sermon.

The *Ummah* should also speak good or else keep silent and were asked to refrain from saying unwanted and despicable words or lies, backstabbing and slander.

"We should use our tongue to read Al-Quran, recite *Zikir* and prayers, to give advice, to disseminate knowledge, speak the truth and do good deeds.

"We will be questioned in the days of hereafter for any words that we say.

"In this modern and hi-tech era, one should watch every word one uses on social media.

"We should take responsibility for what we spread on the social media and ensure that the story is verified, authentic and truthful," Imams said.

If a person wants to say something, he should think beforehand.

If it seems to him that it will not do any harm, then he should speak, but if he thinks otherwise, then he should refrain from speaking.

Islam teaches the *Ummah* that if one wishes to give advice, they must think first. One should not advise if it brings harm.

"Making offensive remarks will destroy ties, spark dispute, create misunderstanding and bring hatred. Let us spread words that bring goodness to mankind, or to carry out welfare activity that gives multiple rewards.

"Pray to Allah the Almighty to keep us away from sinful acts and evils," Imams concluded.
